How can, and should, we change our systems in the future? How can learning from changes due to Corona help us further?

We learned a lot in webinar 1:

- Significant and rapid changes have been enacted as a direct result of the Corona crisis. Examples across the Nordic countries are:
 - All governments have provided larger degrees of freedom when it comes to the role of the funding agencies.
 - Universities, among many other institutions, have digitized large parts of their structures when it comes to both research and education.
- We are doing things at a much **higher pace** than we are used to. The discussions has been faster and more informal, and it has become easier to create a dialogue with decisionmakers across sectors
- There has been a **strong sense of urgency** we need to change our system and take even more responsibility for the societal transformation
- While the Nordic countries are similar in many ways, there have been significant differences present when it comes to handling the Corona crisis. We can learn from each other
- There were many calls for increasing the collaboration across the Nordic countries and with the rest of Europe

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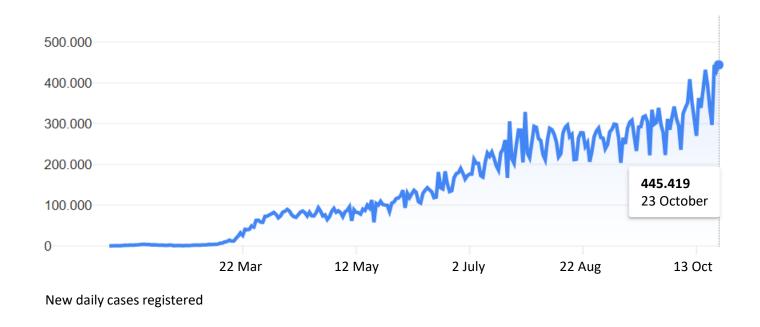

Health Authorities:

- 1 in 5 companies have received financial aid in 2020 – 60,900 companies have used the refusion/furlough schemes (<u>link</u>)
- Government has launched a "statistical bank" showing amount of stimulus received and government spending (<u>link</u>)

Private sector:

- Increase in the national funding for research and development by 2 bil. Nkr. (link)
- Private companies are applying for R&D funding at unprecedented levels due to the Corona crisis (link)

Universities:

For the university and university college sector an additional 4,000 study places are included, and flexible educations receive a combined grant of 45.7 mio. Nkr. (link)

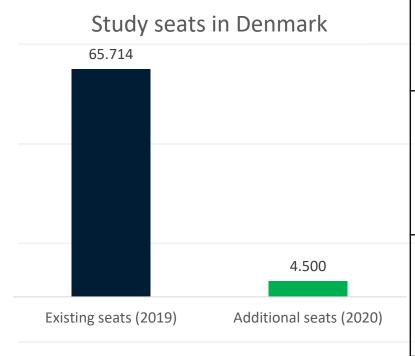

TIMELINE – DENMARK

(POPULATION: 5,81 MIO)



Health authorities:

- Prolonged restrictions in the wake of second wave employees are encouraged to work from home (<u>link</u>)
- Guidelines expanded to include more outside activities and maximum of 10 people.

Private sector:

- Private companies have regained optimism when it comes to focusing on long-term investments (<u>link</u>)
- The no. of bankruptcies has been kept at a normal level thanks to the stimulus packages – the hotel and service industry has been severely hit (<u>link</u>)

Universities:

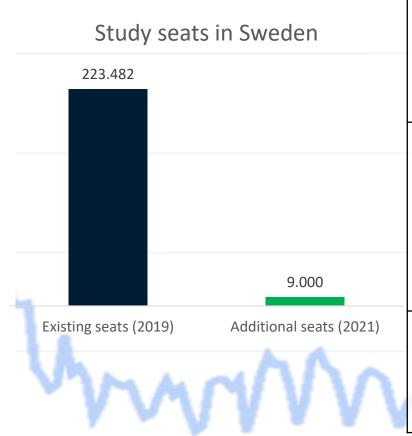
- More students have applied for universities compared to earlier. No indications of higher dropout rates or lower test results. However, there is a tendency for more ph.d. candidates being delayed.

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(POPULATION: 10,23 MIO)



Health authorities:

- Large variations over the country which has led to regional differences in restrictions.
- Some restrictions from the health authorities have been relaxed, for instance concerning the number of spectators at sports and cultural events.

Private sector:

- Recovery in the business sector continued in August and sales rose by 2 percent compared with the previous month, according to Statistics Sweden's preliminary sales indicator. (link)
- The unemployment rate in Sept was 8.3 percent, which is an increase of 2.3 percentage points compared to the corresponding month a year ago.

Universities:

Expected decline in private research funding for 2021. A lump-sum of 500 MSEK is added to the regular block funding to higher education institutions in the budget bill for 2021.

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TIMELINE – FINLAND

(POPULATION: 5,52 MIO)



July August September October

Important points:

- Across the countries, bankruptcies have been kept at a somewhat normal level thanks to the stimulus packages however, the **hotel and service industries** have been severely hit.
- **Thousands more applicants** to university and university college educations in 2020 due to national borders being closed.
- Heavy increase in public **R&D support/funding** or increased deductible for private companies.
